PARK HOURS

The park is open daily from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. for use year-round.

CAMPGROUND QUIET HOURS

Quiet hours are between 10 p.m. – 7 a.m. year-round. Generator usage is allowed in designated areas from 8 a.m. – 8 p.m.

FIREWOOD

To help prevent the spread of invasive species, we ask that visitors do not bring or use out-of-state firewood. Collecting firewood in the park is prohibited. Firewood can be purchased from the campground host in the summer, and from the Visitor Center off-season.

PETS ON LEASHES

Pets are welcome but must stay on a leash while in the state park. A dog park is located in the southern part of the park.

EMERGENCY INFO

In an emergency dial 911. Find fire danger ratings and restrictions at ndresponse.gov.

VISITOR TIPS

Please follow speed limits. Keep an eye out for wild animals and respect their habitat by remaining a safe distance.

Visitors are prohibited from collecting and removing any natural items or artifacts from the park.

Camping:

check-in is at 4 p.m., checkout is at 3 p.m.

Overnight rentals:

check-in is 4 p.m., check-out is at noon

MUST SEE & DO

Experience what life was like for North Dakota’s homesteaders by touring the historic Sunne Farm.

Rent a kayak and relax as you float along the Sheyenne River Water Trail.

Trek to the scenic overlook and make sure to bring your camera to capture the beautiful Sheyenne River Valley in the background.

Hike the North Country Scenic Trail. This 4,600-mile trail starts in Vermont and runs through the park, through Lake Sakakawea State Park, and eventually joins the Lewis & Clark National Historic Trail.

MORE TO EXPLORE

Experience 20 miles of trails that climb through the rolling hills to beautiful overlooks back down to the Sheyenne River bottom. Jump on the North Country Scenic Trail and see North Dakota’s only registered waterfall.

Grab a fishing rod and cast out along the Sheyenne River and try your luck at catching a walleye, catfish, northern pike, rock bass or bullheads.

Join us in celebrating the annual Sodbuster Days, providing early, horse-drawn farming demonstrations and displays. The celebration is held the second full weekend in July and the first weekend after Labor Day.

Browse the interpretive panels in the Visitor Center while enjoying a frozen treat from the concession store.

VISITING IN WINTER

Visitors can enjoy over 10 miles of trails open to cross-country skiing, hiking, and snowshoeing during the winter.

The Sheyenne Valley State Snowmobile Trail System runs through the state park. Pack up a sled and explore the trail system in and around the park.

Curl up by the fire in one of Fort Ransom’s three overnight rental facilities that are available year-round. Check out the Bjone House or one of the yurts for your next stay.
