Harris Beach offers several short trails to viewpoints and the beach with opportunities to see a large assortment of plants and wildlife. Junior Ranger programs open to children age 6-12 and evening campfire programs for everyone are offered throughout the summer. 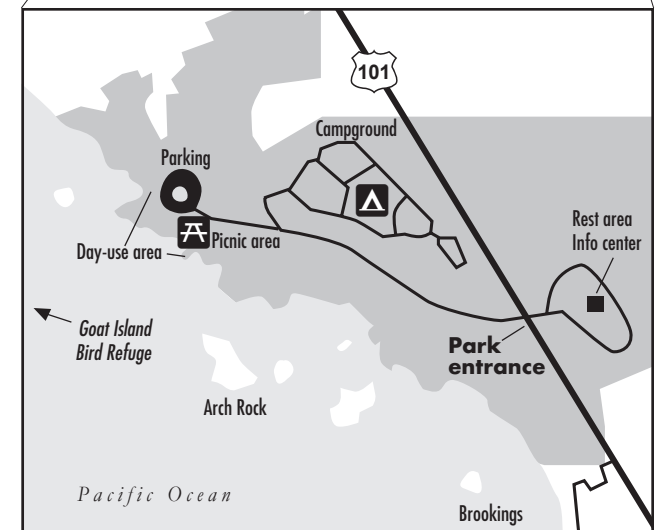
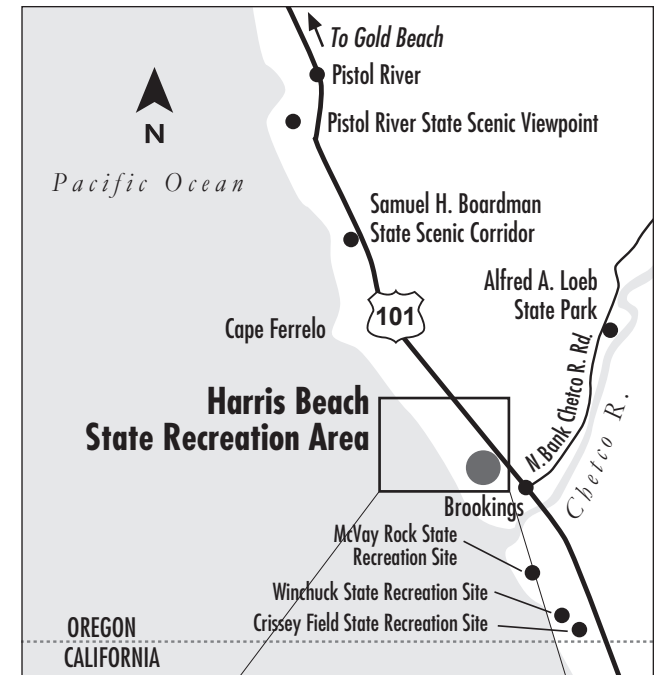
Samuel H. Boardman State Scenic Corridor: This 12-mile-long day-use park along Highway 101 is a series of scenic waysides, some with picnic tables where you can sit and enjoy unparalleled ocean views. Or you can explore the park by foot via the Oregon Coast Trail. The south end of the park is only three miles north of Harris Beach. **Play it safe, stay on established trails!**

Boats in Brookings: A boat launching ramp, moorage facilities, boat rentals and charter boat service are available at the south jetty, near the mouth of the Chetco River.

Smoking in Oregon State Parks is allowed only in personal vehicles, RVs, paid campsites and portions of day use parks along state highways that are designated as safety rest areas by the Oregon Department of Transportation.

Alfred A. Loeb State Park: This myrtlewood grove 8 miles inland from Brookings offers access to the wild and scenic Chetco River, and is next to the U.S. Forest Service's Redwood Nature Trail, which is the northernmost stand of redwoods on the Pacific Coast.

Additional beach access: McVay Rock, Crissey Field and Winchuck State Recreation Sites offer access to beaches south of Brookings. A visitor welcome center at Crissey Field has more information about things to see and do in the area.





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
