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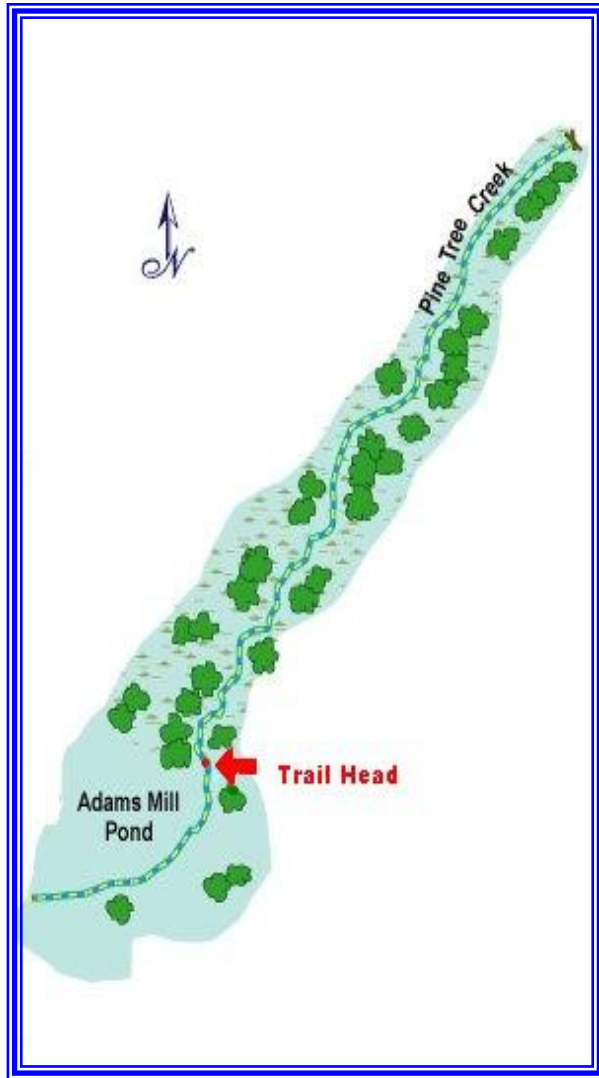

Big Pine Tree Creek Canoe Trail

Minutes from **Camden, South Carolina**, in the heart of N. R.

Goodale State Park, lies a hidden water treasure: **Big Pine Tree Creek Canoe Trail**.

Enjoy paddling on Adams Mill Pond, and then enter the ancient cypress forest on the well-marked trail. Look for the variety of wildlife along your way. Bring your own canoe or kayak, or rent a canoe or kayak at the park office.



The Big Pine Tree Creek Canoe Trail is 3 miles long, and travels along Big Pine Tree Creek. Notice the change in environment and water temperature as you get about half way through the trail. The trail gradually looks more and more like a creek bed. On the way back, the current will help carry you and you can relax in the soothing environment and enjoy the scenery even more.

Learning opportunities abound in this outdoor classroom where conservation education, history, resource management, and wildlife studies can enhance classroom instruction. Local and migrating wildlife frequent the trail and cypress

swamp; listen for woodpeckers, hawks, frogs and insects and observe reptiles, amphibians, birds and mammals. The trail is open to the public from 9 AM to 6 PM.
